We write to you to urge you to table the Stoddard Ordinance in favor of waiting for the results of the NM Tech study regarding their air, water and geographical studies. In the meantime before the expected results are available next May, you have the opportunity to create a citizen/expert task force which could help you create a more extensive and protective ordinance. This task force should include a diverse group of residents including the tribes.

The items which concern us the most include:

^{*}public input and notice for all future applications to explore and drill.

^{*}review and approval from the P&Z Commission as well as yourselves.

^{*}monitoring and base line testing costs of air and water quality should be born by the applicants as has been written into other county ordinances without losing business.

^{*}continuing the "special use" permit approach which guarantees greater scrutiny of the applicants ability to comply with our regulations as well as your ability to "vet" their solvency and ability to produce appropriate bonds and insurance.

^{*}the seismic make up of lower Sandoval County is dangerously susceptible to horizontal fracturing and ground water seepage into the ABQ basin which provides clean water to close to 1,000,000 residents.
