

### Introduction

In 2014 the State Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (DHSEM) required each community receiving Emergency Preparedness Performance Grant (EMPG) funding to complete a Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) for their community; in 2014 an initial THIRA was developed based off that requirement for Sandoval County. As a condition of continued EMPG funding Sandoval County's THIRA must be revised on an annual basis. This revised THIRA for 2015 includes two additional Threat / Hazards and has been reformatted.

## **Purpose**

The purpose of a THIRA is for every community to understand the risks it faces. By understanding its risks, a community can make smart decisions about how to manage risk, including developing needed capabilities. Risk is the potential for an unwanted outcome resulting from an incident, event, or occurrence, as determined by its likelihood and the associated consequences. By considering changes to these elements, a community can understand how to best manage and plan for its greatest risks across the full range of the threats and hazards it faces. The <sup>1</sup>THIRA process helps communities identify capability targets and resource requirements necessary to address anticipated and unanticipated risks

### **THIRA Structure**

This THIRA is structured as follows: Threats and Hazards are identified; under each Core Capability the desired Outcomes and Impacts are identified for each Threat and hazard, Capability Targets, Resource Requirements: NIMS Tier I Resources and Resource Requirements: Other Resources. Under Resource Requirements: Other, under this Planning, Organization, Equipment, Training, and Exercise (POETE) is identified. See Basic Structure below.

Step one of the Sandoval County THIRA centers on the identification of the variety of threats and hazards that are applicable to the County. The analysis centers on three types of events:

**Natural hazards**: are those resulting from acts of nature, such as earthquakes, or tornadoes and disease outbreaks or epidemics.

**Technological hazards**: are those resulting from accidents or the failures of systems and structures, such as hazardous materials spills or dam failures.

**Threats or human-caused threats**: are those resulting from the intentional actions of an adversary, such as a threatened or actual chemical or biological attack or cyber event
