I'm writing you as a concerned resident of the Placitas Community. I read the article in The SignPost.

To suggest that "the horses have become a hazard for motorists" without addressing the excessive speeding and reckless driving that I witness every single day I drive on 165, that is a very real hazard to motorists, (and horses) is very unfortunate. It's a marked Wildlife Corridor that many drivers continue to choose to ignore.

The stallion that was hit in December of 2021, was due to the reckless driving that was shown on someone's dash cam. He pulled out in front the car and was swerving and clearly agitated. He was driving in excessive speeds through the village of upwards of 75 miles an hour in a 35 right before the horse was killed. IF he had been going the speed limit he would have had time to stop. He virtually got a slap on the wrist and if he behaved well for a year can now go back to his prior driving. The speed limits exist for a reason. In all of my years driving in the various places I've lived, including Chicago, I have NEVER seen the kind of speeding and reckless driving I encounter on 165 on a daily basis. Passing in no passing zones, excessive speeding, tailgating, passing the S-curve, including intimidation tactics.

I've call various companies whenever I see their name on the side of business vehicle and I'm being passed in a no passing zone, or tailgated and let that business know it's not appreciated. Then you have the residents who literally have less than zero care.
