I. INTRODUCTION

A. PURPOSE OF THIS REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

The Sandoval County Board of County Commissioners is accepting sealed proposals to update the Sandoval County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (NIGP Commodity Codes 91881, 91892, 96252). Responses will be accepted in the Finance Department, Attn: Leslie Olivas, Sandoval County Administrative Bldg, 1500 Idalia Road, Bldg. D 2nd Floor, P.O. Box 40, Bernalillo, New Mexico up to 3:00 p.m. (Mountain Standard Time) on January 23, 2024. Late submissions will not be considered. The Sandoval County Board of Commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all responses.

B. SANDOVAL COUNTY BACKGROUND

Sandoval County is a Class A county located in central New Mexico. It covers over 3,700 square miles of both urban and rural areas with a population of approximately 148,800 people according the 2020 census. Sandoval County has a commission/manager form of government. The Board of County Commissioners consist of five members elected by voters within their respective districts. The County Manager is appointed by the Commission to carry out policy and serve as chief administrative officer.

Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPP) are authorized and defined in Title I of the Healthy Forests Restoration Act (HFRA). Federal and state funding for hazardous fuel reduction projects is dependent on whether a county or community has a signed and approved CWPP.

CWPP's have three main components: (1) Collaboration with all stakeholders throughout the CWPP process, (2) Identification and prioritization of hazardous fuel reduction areas, and (3) addressing the treatment of structural ignitability within the CWPP area.

C. SCOPE OF PROCUREMENT

The Sandoval County ("County") Purchasing Office, on behalf of the County Manager, is soliciting proposals from prospective offerors for updating the County's current CWPP to meet the requirements of Title 1 of the Healthy Forests Restoration Act (HFRA).

The successful Offeror will work collaboratively with the Sandoval County Office of Emergency Management to present the completed plan to the New Mexico Department of Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources for final adoption.

D. TERM OF CONTRACT

This Request for Proposal is to contract on a yearly basis with the option to renew the contract annually for a maximum of four (4) years subject to funding availability and satisfactory completion of the Scope of Services. The resulting contract will be a single award.

E. PROCUREMENT MANAGER

B. EXPLANATION OF EVENTS

The following paragraphs describe the activities listed in the sequence of events shown in Section II. A., above.

1. Issuance of RFP

This RFP is being issued on behalf of the Sandoval County Fire Department.

2. Acknowledgement of Receipt

Potential Offerors may e-mail, hand deliver, return by facsimile or registered or certified mail the "Acknowledgement of Receipt of Request for Proposals Form" that accompanies this document, APPENDIX A, to have the offeror placed on the procurement distribution list. The form should be signed by an authorized representative of the offeror, dated and returned to the Procurement Manager.

The procurement distribution list will be used for the distribution of written responses to questions.

3. Deadline to Submit Written Questions

Potential Offerors may submit written questions to the Procurement Manager as to the intent or clarity of this RFP as indicated in the sequence of events. All written questions must be addressed to the Procurement Manager as declared in Section I, Paragraph E. Questions shall be clearly labeled and shall cite the section(s) in the RFP or other document which form the basis of the question.

4. Response to Written Questions

Responses to written questions will be distributed as indicated in the sequence of events to all potential Offerors whose name appears on the procurement distribution list. An e-mail copy will be sent to all Offeror's that provide Acknowledgement of Receipt Forms.

5. Submission of Proposals

ALL OFFEROR PROPOSALS MUST BE RECEIVED FOR REVIEW AND EVALUATION BY THE PROCUREMENT MANAGER OR DESIGNEE NO LATER THAN 3:00 PM MOUNTAIN STANDARD TIME (MST) ON **JANUARY 23, 2024**. **Proposals received after this deadline will not be accepted**. The date and time of receipt will be recorded on each proposal.

Proposals must be addressed and delivered to the Procurement Manager at the address listed in Section I, Paragraph E2. Proposals must be sealed and labeled on the outside of the package to clearly indicate that they are in response to the **Sandoval County CWPP** and **RFP# FY24-FIRE-01**. Proposals submitted by facsimile or other electronic means will not be accepted.

A public log will be kept of the names of all Offerors that submitted proposals. Pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 13-1-116, the contents of proposals shall not be disclosed to competing potential Offerors during the negotiation process. The negotiation process is deemed to be in effect until the contract is awarded pursuant to this Request for Proposals.

6. Proposal Evaluation

An Evaluation Committee will perform the evaluation of proposals. This process will take place as indicated in the sequence of events, depending upon the number of proposals received. During this time, the Procurement Manager may initiate discussions with Offerors who submit responsive or potentially responsive proposals for the purpose of clarifying aspects of the proposals. However, proposals may be accepted and evaluated without such discussion. Discussions SHALL NOT be initiated by the Offerors.

7. Finalize Contractual Agreements

Any Contractual agreement(s) resulting from this RFP will be finalized with the most advantageous Offeror(s) as per schedule, Sequence of Events or as soon thereafter as

possible. This date is subject to change at the discretion of the Sandoval County. In the event mutually agreeable terms cannot be reached with the apparent most advantageous Offeror in the time specified, the County reserves the right to finalize a contractual agreement with the next most advantageous Offeror(s) without undertaking a new procurement process.

8. Contract Awards

The contract shall be awarded to the Offeror (or Offerors) whose proposals are most advantageous to Sandoval County taking into consideration the evaluation factors set forth in this RFP. The most advantageous proposal may or may not have received the most points. The award is subject to appropriate Sandoval County Commission approval.

9. Protest Deadline

Any protest by an Offeror must be timely and in conformance with NMSA 1978, § 13-1-172 and applicable procurement regulations. As a Protest Manager has been named in this Request for Proposals, pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 13-1-172, ONLY protests delivered directly to the Protest Manager in writing and in a timely fashion will be considered to have been submitted properly and in accordance with statute, rule and this Request for Proposals. The 15-calendar day protest period shall begin on the day following the award of contracts and will end at 5:00 pm Mountain Standard Time/Daylight Time on the 15th day. Protests must be written and must include the name and address of the protestor and the request for proposal number. It must also contain a statement of the grounds for protest including appropriate supporting exhibits and it must specify the ruling requested from the party listed below. Protests received after the deadline will not be accepted.

C. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. Acceptance of Conditions Governing the Procurement

Potential Offerors must indicate their acceptance of the Conditions Governing the Procurement section in the letter of transmittal (Appendix C). Submission of a proposal constitutes acceptance of the Evaluation Factors.

2. Incurring Cost

Any cost incurred by the potential Offeror in preparation, transmittal, and/or presentation of any proposal or material submitted in response to this RFP shall be borne solely by the Offeror. Any cost incurred by the Offeror for set up and demonstration of the proposed equipment and/or system shall be borne solely by the Offeror.

3. Prime Contractor Responsibility

Any contractual agreement that may result from this RFP shall specify that the prime contractor is solely responsible for fulfillment of all requirements of the contractual agreement which may derive from this RFP.

4. Amended Proposals

An Offeror may submit an amended proposal before the deadline for receipt of proposals. Such amended proposals must be complete replacements for a previously submitted proposal and must be clearly identified as such in the transmittal letter. The County personnel will not merge, collate, or assemble proposal materials.

5. Offeror's Rights to Withdraw Proposal

Offerors will be allowed to withdraw their proposals at any time prior to the deadline for receipt of proposals. The Offeror must submit a written withdrawal request addressed to the Procurement Manager and signed by the Offeror's duly authorized representative.

The approval or denial of withdrawal requests received after the deadline for receipt of the proposals is governed by the applicable procurement regulations.

6. Proposal Offer Firm

Responses to this RFP, including proposal prices for services, will be considered firm for one hundred twenty (120) days after the due date for receipt of proposals or ninety (90) days after the due date for the receipt of a best and final offer, if the Offeror is invited or required to submit one.

7. Disclosure of Proposal Contents

- A. Proposals will be kept confidential until negotiations and the award are completed by the County. At that time, all proposals and documents pertaining to the proposals will be open to the public, except for material that is clearly marked proprietary or confidential. The Procurement Manager will not disclose or make public any pages of a proposal on which the potential Offeror has stamped or imprinted "proprietary" or "confidential" subject to the following requirements:
- B. Proprietary or confidential data shall be readily separable from the proposal in order to facilitate eventual public inspection of the non-confidential portion of the proposal.
- C. Confidential data is restricted to:
 - 1. Confidential financial information concerning the Offeror's organization.
 - 2. and data that qualifies as a trade secret in accordance with the Uniform Trade Secrets Act, NMSA 1978 § 57-3A-1 to 57-3A-7.
 - 3. PLEASE NOTE: The price of products offered or the cost of services proposed shall not be designated as proprietary or confidential information.

8. No Obligation

This RFP in no manner obligates Sandoval County to the use of any Offeror's services until a valid written contract is awarded and approved by appropriate authorities.

9. Termination

This RFP may be canceled at any time and any and all proposals may be rejected in whole or in part when the agency determines such action to be in the best interest of Sandoval County.

10. Sufficient Appropriation

Any contract awarded as a result of this RFP process may be terminated if sufficient appropriations or authorizations do not exist. Such terminations will be affected by sending written notice to the contractor. The County's decision as to whether sufficient appropriations and authorizations are available will be accepted by the contractor as final.

11. Legal Review

The County requires that all Offerors agree to be bound by the General Requirements contained in this RFP. Any Offeror's concerns must be promptly submitted in writing to the attention of the Procurement Manager.

12. Governing Law

This RFP and any agreement with an Offeror which may result from this procurement shall be governed by the laws of the State of New Mexico.

13. Basis for Proposal

Only information supplied, in writing, by Sandoval County through the Procurement Manager or in this RFP should be used as the basis for the preparation of Offeror proposals.

14. Offeror Qualifications

The Evaluation Committee may make such investigations as necessary to determine the ability of the potential Offeror to adhere to the requirements specified within this RFP. The Evaluation Committee will reject the proposal of any potential Offeror who is not a Responsible Offeror or fails to submit a responsive offer as defined in NMSA 1978, § 13-1-83 and 13-1-85.

15. Right to Waive Minor Irregularities

The Evaluation Committee reserves the right to waive minor irregularities. The Evaluation Committee also reserves the right to waive mandatory requirements provided that all of the otherwise responsive proposals failed to meet the same mandatory requirements and the failure to do so does not otherwise materially affect the procurement. This right is at the sole discretion of the Evaluation Committee.

16. Change in Contractor Representatives

The County reserves the right to require a change in contractor representatives if the assigned representative(s) is (are) not, in the opinion of the County, adequately meeting the needs of the County.

17. Notice of Penalties

The Procurement Code, NMSA 1978, § 13-1-28 through 13-1-199, imposes civil, misdemeanor and felony criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, the New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for bribes, gratuities and kickbacks.

18. Right to Publish

Throughout the duration of this procurement process and contract term, Offerors and contractors must secure from the County written approval prior to the release of any information that pertains to the potential work or activities covered by this procurement and/or County contracts deriving from this procurement. Failure to adhere to this requirement may result in disqualification of the Offeror's proposal or removal from the contract.

19. Ownership of Proposals

All documents submitted in response to the RFP shall become property of Sandoval County.

20. Confidentiality

Any confidential information provided to, or developed by, the contractor in the performance of the contract resulting from this RFP shall be kept confidential and shall not be made available to any individual or organization by the contractor without the prior written approval of the County.

The Contractor(s) agrees to protect the confidentiality of all confidential information and not to publish or disclose such information to any third party without the procuring County's written permission.

21. Use of Electronic Versions of this RFP

This RFP is being made available by electronic means. In the event of conflict between a version of the RFP in the Offeror's possession and the version maintained by the agency, the Offeror acknowledges that the version maintained by the County shall govern.

22. Campaign Contribution Disclosure Form

Offeror must complete, sign, and return the Campaign Contribution Disclosure Form (Appendix B) as a part of their proposal. Failure to complete and return the signed unaltered form will result in disqualification.

23. Letter of Transmittal

Offeror's proposal must be accompanied by the Letter of Transmittal Form (Appendix C) which must be completed and signed by an individual person authorized to obligate the company. The letter of transmittal MUST:

- 1. Identify the submitting business entity.
- 2. Identify the name, title, telephone, and e-mail address of the person authorized by the Offeror organization to contractually obligate the business entity providing the Offer.
- 3. Identify the name, title, telephone, and e-mail address of the person authorized to negotiate the contract on behalf of the organization (if different than (2) above).
- 4. Identify the names, titles, telephone, and e-mail addresses of persons to be contacted for clarification/questions regarding proposal content.
- 5. Sub-contractor will not be authorized for this procurement.
- 6. Identify the following with a check mark and signature where required:
 - a. indicate acceptance of the Conditions Governing the Procurement <u>indicate</u> acceptance of this RFP; and
 - b. Acknowledge receipt of any and all amendments to this RFP.
- 7. Be signed by the person identified in #2 above.

24. Disclosure Regarding Responsibility

- A. Any prospective Contractor and any of its Principals who enter into a contract greater than sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) with any state agency or local public body for professional services, tangible personal property, services or construction agrees to disclose whether the Contractor, or any principal of the Contractor's company:
 - 1. is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, or declared ineligible for award of contract by any federal entity, state agency or local public body.
 - 2. has within a three-year period preceding this offer, been convicted in a criminal matter or had a civil judgment rendered against them for:
 - a. the commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state or local) contract or sub-contract.
 - b. violation of Federal or state antitrust statutes related to the submission of offers; or
 - c. the commission in any federal or state jurisdiction of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, tax evasion, violation of Federal criminal tax law, or receiving stolen property.
 - 3. is presently indicted for, or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by any (federal state or local) government entity with the commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph A of this disclosure.
 - 4. has, preceding this offer, been notified of any delinquent Federal or state taxes in an amount that exceeds \$3,000.00 of which the liability remains unsatisfied. Taxes are considered delinquent if the following criteria apply:
 - a. The tax liability is finally determined. The liability is finally determined if it has been assessed. A liability is not finally determined if there is a pending administrative or judicial challenge. In the case of a judicial challenge of the liability, the liability is not finally determined until all judicial appeal rights have been exhausted.
 - b. The taxpayer is delinquent in making payment. A taxpayer is delinquent if the taxpayer has failed to pay the tax liability when full payment was due and required. A taxpayer is not delinquent in cases where enforced collection action is precluded.
 - c. Have within a three-year period preceding this offer, had one or more contracts terminated for default by any federal or state agency or local public body.)
- B. Principal, for the purpose of this disclosure, means an officer, director, owner, partner, or a person having primary management or supervisory responsibilities within a business entity or related entities.
- C. The Contractor shall provide immediate written notice to the State Purchasing Agent or other party to this Agreement if, at any time during the term of this Agreement, the Contractor learns that the Contractor's disclosure was at any time erroneous or became

erroneous by reason of changed circumstances.

- D. A disclosure that any of the items in this requirement exist will not necessarily result in termination of this Agreement. However, the disclosure will be considered in the determination of the Contractor's responsibility and ability to perform under this Agreement. Failure of the Contractor to furnish a disclosure or provide additional information as requested will render the Offeror nonresponsive.
- E. Nothing contained in the foregoing shall be construed to require establishment of a system of records in order to render, in good faith, the disclosure required by this document. The knowledge and information of a Contractor is not required to exceed that which is the normally possessed by a prudent person in the ordinary course of business dealings.
- F. The disclosure requirement provided is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when making an award and is a continuing material representation of the facts during the term of this Agreement. If during the performance of the contract, the Contractor is indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by any government entity (federal, state or local) with commission of any offenses named in this document the Contractor must provide immediate written notice to the State Contractor knowingly rendered an erroneous disclosure, in addition to other remedies available to the Government, the State Purchasing Agent or Central Purchasing Officer may terminate the involved contract for cause. Still further the State Purchasing Agent or Central Purchasing Officer may suspend or debar the Contractor from eligibility for future solicitations until such time as the matter is resolved to the satisfaction of the State Purchasing Agent or Central Purchasing Officer.

25. Use by Other Government Agencies

By submitting a bid or proposal, the Bidder or offeror indicates that they understand and agree that other local public bodies and state agencies with the State of New Mexico, if allowed by their governing directives, may contact for the goods and services included in this procurement document with the awarded Contractor(s). Contractual engagements accomplished under this provision shall be solely between the awarded Contractor and the contracting government entity with no obligation or liability by Sandoval County.

26. Electronic Mail Address Required

A large part of the communication regarding this procurement will be conducted by electronic mail (e-mail). Offeror must have a valid e-mail address to receive this correspondence. **E-mail address will be provided on Appendix A which will be submitted in a timely manner.**

27. New Mexico Preferences

To ensure adequate consideration and application of NMSA 1978, § 13-1-21 (as amended). Offerors **MUST** include a copy of their preference certificate with their proposal.

Certificates for preferences must be obtained through the New Mexico Department of Taxation & Revenue:

- A. New Mexico Resident Business Preference
 - A copy of the certification must accompany Offeror's proposal.
- B. New Mexico Native American Resident Business Preference A copy of the certification must accompany Offeror's proposal.
- C. New Mexico Resident Veterans Business Preference
 A copy of the certification must accompany Offeror's proposal.
- D. New Mexico Native American Resident Veterans Business Preference A copy of the certification must accompany Offeror's proposal

An agency shall not award a business for more than one preference.

The New Mexico Preferences shall not apply when the expenditures for this RFP includes federal funds.

III. RESPONSE FORMAT AND ORGANIZATION

This section describes the format and organization of the Offeror's responses. Failure to conform to these guidelines may result in the disqualification of the proposal.

1. NUMBER OF RESPONSES

Offerors shall submit only one proposal in response to this RFP.

2. NUMBER OF COPIES

A. Hard Copy Responses

Offeror's proposal must be clearly **labeled and numbered and indexed**. Proposals must be submitted as outlined below. The original copy shall be clearly marked as such on the front of the binder. Envelopes, packages or boxes containing the original and the copies must be clearly labeled and submitted in a sealed envelope, package, or box bearing the following information:

Offerors must deliver:

- **Technical Proposals** One (1) ORIGINAL and three (3) HARD COPIES (4 TOTAL).
- Cost Proposals One (1) ORIGINAL and three (3) HARD COPIES (4 TOTAL).
- Please include an electronic copy (flash drive) of the Technical and Cost Proposal.

The original hard copy information **must** be identical. In the event of a conflict between versions of the submitted proposal, the original hard copy shall govern.

Any proposal that does not adhere to these requirements, may be deemed non-responsive and rejected on that basis.

Sandoval County cannot provide materials such as boxes, envelopes, or tape to a potential Offeror who brings in an unsealed proposal. Unsealed proposals will not be accepted and are considered to be non-responsive to the requirements laid out in this RFP.

3. PROPOSAL FORMAT

All proposals must be submitted as follows:

Hard copies must be typewritten on standard 8 ½" x 11" paper (larger paper is permissible for charts, spreadsheets, etc.) and placed within binders with tabs delineating each section.

Organization of folders/envelopes for hard copy proposals:

Direct reference to pre-prepared or promotional material may be used if referenced and clearly marked. The proposal **must be organized and indexed** in the following format and must contain, at a minimum, all listed items in the sequence indicated. Promotional material should be **minimal**.

- C. Proposal Summary (Optional)
- D. Response to Contract Terms and Conditions

- F. Response to Specifications

 - 4. Conflict of Interest Affidavit (Appendix E)
 - 5. Signed Campaign Contribution Form (Appendix B)
 - 6. New Mexico Preferences (if applicable)
 - 7. Financial Stability
 - 8. Proof of Insurance and/or Surety Bonds
 - 9. Other Supporting Material (if applicable)

2. COST PROPOSAL – Binder 2 MUST BE IN A SEPARATE SEALED ENVELOPE

A. All costs to be incurred and billed to the county shall be described in detail. The Offeror should understand that the costs of insurance maintained by the organization in connection with the general conduct of its operation are allowable provided: that the types and content of coverage is in accordance with sound business practice and the rates and

- premiums are reasonable under the circumstances. Liability for that item remains with the Offeror. The proposed price quoted must include all applicable costs and applicable taxes.
- B. Offeror should submit a proposal with a detailed schedule of total costs per task. Offeror should also provide unit cost estimated (hourly, etc.) and time schedule for each task with in each task. The Offeror shall quote hourly rates for additional consulting beyond the scope of the described tasks.

Within each section of the proposal, Offerors should address the items in the order indicated above. All forms provided in this RFP must be thoroughly completed and included in the appropriate section of the proposal.

The proposal summary may be included by potential Offerors to provide the Evaluation Committee with an overview of the proposal; however, this material will not be used in the evaluation process unless specifically referenced from other portions of the Offeror's proposal.

IV. SPECIFICATIONS

Offerors should respond in the form of a thorough narrative to each specification, unless otherwise instructed. The narratives, including required supporting materials, will be evaluated and awarded points accordingly.

A. DETAILED SCOPE OF WORK

Sandoval County is seeking proposals for the update of the Sandoval County Community Wildfire Protection Plan. The following specifications are to be used as guidelines in submitting proposals and shall be made a part of the contract between Sandoval County and the Successful Offeror. The Successful Offeror shall be required to perform the following services including, but not limited to:

County Wide Protection Plan (CWPP) Update

1. Engage Interested Parties and Form a Core Team

The Contractor, with assistance from Sandoval County, will assemble and convene the CWPP Core Team and/or determine new and additional stakeholders who should be invited to participate. Core Team members could also be derived from the agency cooperators list utilized for annual fire preparedness meetings. The Core Team will represent important agencies and stakeholder groups with an interest in wildfire prevention and will be responsible for developing the CWPP risk assessment, developing recommendations for fire prevention and a risk list of attendees and minutes from all Core Team meetings. The Contractor will coordinate, facilitate, and conduct follow-ups for meeting with the Core Team throughout the planning process. The first meeting will be within six weeks of contract award. The Core Team will review the original plan, identify changes to the risk assessment and make recommendations for risk reduction

measures and projects, the meetings will last approximately two hours. Core Team members will provide all requested information within two weeks of request.

2. Establish a Community Base Map

Working collaboratively with the Core Team, the Contractor will update the existing community base maps for the CWPP that encompass the entire project area. The maps will present information on including but not limited to land ownership boundaries, vegetated areas that may contain critical human infrastructure, community wildland urban interface (WUI) areas at risk, forest and grassland areas at risk for large-scale fire disturbance, watershed boundaries, fire history and previous fuel treatments, topographic conditions, access roads, hazardous material locations and locations of suppression resources. Community base maps will be completed within three months of award. No new base maps will be required; only minor edits to the originals may be needed. The County and Core Team will provide all requested GIS data within two weeks of request.

3. Develop an Initial CWPP Outline

The Contractor in collaboration with the Core Team will determine the structure and content of the CWPP and ensure that the CWPP update adheres to State guidelines. In order to modernize the document, the Contractor should align the CWPP update with the three goals of the National Cohesive Strategy: Restore and Maintain Landscapes; Fire-Adapted Communities; and Respond to Wildfires. Federal agencies utilize the Cohesive Strategy when developing policy and budgets; this approach therefore would align the County with future federal funding, prepositioning all stakeholders to better leverage funding sources for projects. Should the County choose this approach, recommendations to treat hazardous fuels, reduce structural ignitability, increase education and outreach, and enhance fire response capability shall be nested within the three goals.

The revised CWPP will be a user-friendly document. The Contractor will facilitate a discussion with the Core Team to determine the most appropriate structure and content for the CWPP in order to keep the document fresh and streamlined, while having the necessary content to provide meaningful analysis and recommendations, and the appropriate detail to support funding applications.

4. Develop a Community Risk Assessment

The Contractor will update the existing graphical and written community risk assessment for the County. This process will involve revisiting the original risk categories (high, medium, low, no risk) assigned to each community, through discussions with the Core Team. The community risk assessment incorporates fuel hazards, risk of fire occurrence, community infrastructure, local preparedness and firefighting capability. The graphical risk assessment will be developed using existing available data, GIS software, and the fire behavior models Flammap and Farsite. The results these models will include predicted rates of spread, flame lengths and fireline intensity derived from fuel conditions, topography, weather and historic fire occurrence data. In addition to the GIS model, the Core Team will revisit the written community assessment and update risk ratings based on changes to population, fuel hazards, infrastructure and emergency response. The County would like to revise the community assessments utilizing the

NFPA 1144 Structural Hazard Assessment protocol as well as home hazard assessment data collected by the Fire Department in WUI areas since 2008. Contractor staff will accompany Sandoval County Fire Department personnel on one field visit to demonstrate the use of the NFPA 1144 form and the County will complete all remaining community assessments and provide results to the Contractor for incorporation into the CWPP. The community assessments will inform recommendations for public education and outreach as well as actions to reduce structural ignitability. These recommendations will form a foundation for future public education and outreach and will complement the Ready, Set, Go program the County has already implemented. The community risk assessment will be completed within four months of award. Edits to the risk assessment will be based on field surveys, desk top analysis and Core Team consultation. The County will complete all community assessments using the NFPA 1144 protocol within two months of the initial field visit with contractor staff.

5. Establish Community Priorities and Recommendations

The Contractor will work with the Core Team to collaboratively discuss the identification of local priorities for fuels treatments and hazard mitigation and review the status of projects proposed in the original CWPP. The Contractor will develop a section to the plan that outlies the progress that has been made since the 2012 CWPP and will identify new priorities for actions, based on current conditions. Various mechanical and prescribed fire hazardous fuels treatments will be discussed and evaluated based on their effectiveness for each vegetation type and for each land ownership type present in the County. Community priorities and recommendations will include consideration of fuel hazards in the WUI, structural ignitability, ignition potential, defensible space concerns, ingress and egress, ROWs, evacuation and emergency notifications, firefighting response and public education and outreach. The Contractor will ensure that all priorities and recommendations align with all relevant existing planning documents, including federal, state, county and municipal land management plans, fire management plans. The Contractor will access the CWPP for mitigation actions and include the outcome as an amendment or addendum to the County hazard mitigation plan. Community priorities and recommendations will be developed with Core Team input within six months of award.

6. Develop an Interim Draft CWPP with an Action Plan

The Contractor will prepare a draft of the CWPP for the Core Team to review and comment on. The Draft will incorporate community priorities and recommendations and will highlight updates and amendments made to the original CWPP. With collaboration from the Core Team and the County, the contractor will develop a detailed implementation strategy and a monitoring plan for long-term success. This strategy will take into consideration those successes and hurdles experienced during implementation of the previous CWPP in order to implement lessons learned. Priority will be placed on projects that serve to protect the community and essential infrastructure, particularly projects in the WUI. The Contractor will also develop and implement a strategy for assessing the document to ensure it remains relevant over the long term. The update will also include a section on post-fire hazards and rehabilitation in order to be in adherence to the State's guidelines for CWPP updates. The Draft CWPP will be submitted to the

Core Team for review within seven months of award. Presentation and Review of the Draft CWPP will be carried out online using a file transfer system. Core Team members will cooperate with electronic review of the document, complying with review schedules.

7. Complete the Final CWPP

The Contractor will prepare the Final CWPP which will include analyses of data, base maps, community risk assessments, prioritized hazard reduction activities, and recommendations to reduce structure ignitability in WUI zones. Information documented from Core Team meetings, such as comments and concerns, will be included as appendices to the CWPP. The County will facilitate the signatories to the CWPP following submission of the Final CWPP by the Contractor. The Contractor will provide the County with two hard copies of the CWPP, an electronic version, all shape files and a list of CWPP communities and their risk ratings. The Final CWPP will be submitted to the County within nine months of award.

8. Implementation of Story Map

In order to ensure the Sandoval CWPP is user-friendly and accessible to all stakeholders and citizens, the Contractor will develop an accompanying CWPP Story Map for the project. A Story Map is an interactive online webpage that could present key findings from the CWPP including spatial data, the CWPP risk assessment, recommendation matrices, implementation funding sources, public outreach information etc. The Contractor will provide examples of Story Maps from other projects on request.

B. TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

1. Organizational Experience:

- a. Provide a comprehensive list of projects of a scale and complexity similar to the project being considered that your firm has completed within the past three years. The list should include the project location, client, services provided by your firm for the project, term of services and an owner contact name.
- b. Provide detailed information on experience with previous Community Prevention Plans and Plan updates including knowledge of current New Mexico Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department plan requirements. Please identify the FEMA Region this plan was submitted for approval to and the date it was approved.
- c. Detail experience with desktop and web GIS as it relates to CWPP planning.
- d. Identify key project staff, task leaders and sub-consultants along with their expected services for the scope of work on behalf of the firm. Resumes should be included for each of the individuals and sub-consultants referenced which demonstrate their qualifications to satisfy all the critical and service requirement areas. The participating governments reserve the right to approve or disapprove all sub-consultants prior to any work being performed.

2. Organizational References

Offerors must provide a minimum of three (3) references from similar projects performed for state or local government clients within the last three (3) years.

The Evaluation Committee may contact any or all references for validation of information submitted. If this step is taken, the Procurement Manager and the Evaluation Committee must all be together on a conference call with the submitted reference so that the Procurement Manager and all members of the Evaluation Committee receive the same information. Additionally, the County reserves the right to consider any and all information available to it.

Offerors shall submit the following Business Reference information as part of the Offer:

- a. Client name;
- b. Project description;
- c. Project dates (starting and ending);
- d. Technical environment (i.e. similar background experience performed); and
- e. Client project manager name, telephone number, fax number and email address.

Offeror is required to submit APPENDIX D, Organizational Reference Questionnaire ("Questionnaire"), to the business references it lists. The business references must submit the Questionnaire directly to the designee identified in APPENDIX D. The business references must not return the completed Questionnaire to the Offeror. It is the Offeror's responsibility to ensure the completed forms are submitted on or before the date indicated in the Sequence of Events for inclusion in the evaluation process.

3. Mandatory Specifications

A brief explanation is required for of each mandatory specification listed below. Offerors are encouraged to fully address each category, as points are assigned:

- a. Contractor shall describe their approach to the revision of the Counties CWPP in accordance with the scope of services described above.
- b. Identify fire mitigation action prioritization processes you have facilitated throughout previous planning projects and what process you anticipate utilizing in this plan revision.
- c. Describe the firm's location where the primary services are to be provided and the ability to meet in person with Core Team members when required during the performance of the Agreement.
- d. Describe how this project fit into your firm's anticipated workload.

4. Business Specifications

Financial Stability

Offeror's must submit copies of the most recent years independently audited financial statements and the most current 10k, as well as financial statements for the proceeding three years if they exist. The submission must include the audit opinion, the balance sheet, statements of income, retained earnings, cash flows and the notes to the financial statements. If independently audited financial statements do not exist, Offeror must state the reason, and instead submit sufficient information (e.g., D & B report) to enable the Evaluation Committee to assess the financial stability of the Offeror.

Insurance

ALL RESPONDENTS MUST submit with their proposal, proof of insurance for Professional Liability in the amount of \$1,000,000. Proof shall be by submission of copies of current policies or current Certificates of Insurance, including the effective dates of coverage. Sandoval County requires the following provisions awarded by vendor:

- Sandoval County to be named as additional insured or an insured on all required policies.
- Sandoval County shall be provided with an unconditional thirty (30) days advance written notice of cancellation or material change (i.e. no limit on the notice of cancellation) on all policies.
- Prior to the execution of the resulting contract, the Sandoval County Purchasing Office shall be supplied with an original certificate of insurance evidencing the stated requirements. This insurance shall be effective for the contract duration and renewal certificates shall also be supplied upon expiration.

V. EVALUATION

A. EVALUATION POINT SUMMARY

B. EVALUATION FACTORS

Points will be awarded based on the thoroughness and clarity of the response of the engagements cited and the perceived validity of the response.

a. Organizational Experience

Points will be awarded based on the thoroughness and clarity of Offeror's response in this Section. The Evaluation Committee will also weigh the relevancy and extent of Offeror's experience, expertise and knowledge; and of personnel education, experience and certifications/licenses. In addition, points will be awarded based on Offeror's candid and well-thought-out response to successes and failures, as well as the ability of the Offeror to learn from its failures and grow from its successes.

b. Organizational References

Points will be awarded based upon an evaluation of the responses to a series of questions on the Organizational Reference Questionnaire (Appendix D). Offeror will be evaluated on references that show positive service history, successful execution of services and evidence of satisfaction by each reference. References indicating significantly similar services/scopes of work and comments provided by a submitted reference will add weight and value to a recommendation during the evaluation process. Points will be awarded for each individual response up to 1/3 of the total points for this category. Lack of a response will receive zero (0) points.

The Evaluation Committee may contact any or all business references for validation of information submitted. If this step is taken, the Procurement Manager and the Evaluation Committee must all be together on a conference call with the submitted reference so that the Procurement Manager and all members of the Evaluation Committee receive the same information. Additionally, the Agency reserves the right to consider any and all information available to it.

c. Mandatory Specifications

Points will be awarded based on the thoroughness and clarity of Offeror's response in this section.

d. Cost

Cost scoring is determined by the following formula:

e. Pass/Fail Section

A "fail" for any item(s) below will result in a non-responsive proposal and the proposal will *not* be evaluated.

- Proof of Insurance

f. New Mexico Preferences

Percentages will be determined based upon the point-based system outlined in NMSA 1978, § 13-1-21 (as amended).

• New Mexico Resident Business Preference

If the Offeror has provided their Preference Certificate the Preference Points for a New Mexico Business is 8% of the total points available in this RFP.

• New Mexico Native American Resident Business Preference

If the Offeror has provided their Preference Certificate the Preference Points for a New Mexico Resident Native American Owned Business Preference is 8% of the total points available in this RFP.

• New Mexico Resident Veterans Business Preference

If the Offeror has provided a copy of their Preference Certificate the Preference Points for a New Mexico Resident Veteran Business is 10% of the total points available in this RFP.

New Mexico Native American Resident Veterans Business Preference

If the Offeror has provided a copy of their Preference Certificate the Preference Points for a New Mexico Resident Veteran Business is 10% of the total points available in this RFP.

g. Interview

If an interview is held, the Purchasing Manager will distribute questions and instructions to the finalists prior to the scheduled interview. A maximum of 100 points are possible in scoring each interview for this RFP. The Evaluation Committee may, at their discretion, request additional clarification as to the contents of the RFP submittal from any of the Offeror's.

EVALUATION PROCESS

- 1. All Offeror proposals will be reviewed for compliance with the requirements and specifications stated within the RFP. Proposals deemed non-responsive will be eliminated from further consideration.
- 2. The Procurement Manager may contact the Offeror for clarification of the response.
- 3. The Evaluation Committee may use other sources of to perform the evaluation.
- 4. Responsive proposals will be evaluated on the factors set forth in the RFP, which have been assigned a point value. The responsible Offerors with the highest scores will be selected as finalist Offerors, based upon the proposals submitted. The responsible Offerors whose proposals are most advantageous to the County taking into consideration the evaluation factors will be recommended for award. Please note, however, that a serious deficiency in the response to any one factor may be grounds for rejection regardless of overall score.

Pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 13-1-191.1 (2006), any person seeking to enter into a contract with any state agency or local public body for professional services, a design and build project delivery system, or the design and installation of measures the primary purpose of which is to conserve natural resources must file this form with that state agency or local public body. This form must be filed even if the contract qualifies as a small purchase or a sole source contract. "Campaign Contribution" includes the payment of a debt incurred in an election campaign, but does not include the value of services provided without compensation or unreimbursed travel or other personal expenses of individuals who volunteer a portion or all of their time on behalf of a candidate or political committee, nor does it include the administrative or solicitation expenses of a political committee that are paid by an organization that sponsors the committee.

"Family member" means spouse, father, mother, child, father-in-law, mother-in-law, daughter-in-law or son-in-law.

"Pendency of the procurement process" means the time period commencing with the public notice of the request for proposals and ending with the award of the contract or the cancellation of the request for proposals.

"Person" means any corporation, partnership, individual, joint venture, association or any other private legal entity.

"Prospective contractor" means a person who is subject to the competitive sealed proposal process set forth in the Procurement Code or is not required to submit a competitive sealed proposal because that person qualifies for a sole source or a small purchase contract.

"Representative of a prospective contractor" means an officer or director of a corporation, a member or manager of a limited liability corporation, a partner of a partnership or a trustee of a trust of the prospective contractor.
