

As many of you are aware, the Placitas Community Library (PCL) is a 501(c)(3) organization and is managed and governed by a Board of Directors. You can read about our Board Members on our website. These Board members assume a fiduciary responsibility, a legal obligation to act in the best interest of PCL in order for the library to grow and thrive in service to our community.

The Board of PCL has been investigating the best ways to manage and grow PCL's finances. With input from several investment planners, it was determined that we needed an investment firm to work with us, using their expertise to help us develop an investment policy. The Board charged the Sustainability Committee with this task. The Sustainability Committee is a Board committee whose purpose is to advise the Board on financial matters including fundraising for PCL.

After interviewing potential investment firms, the Sustainability Committee recommended Altalune Wealth Advisors, Kelley and Ric Tredwin to the Board as the firm that best fit our need to help us to develop our investment policy. The Board approved the selection of Altalune at our May 2023 Board meeting unanimously. Altalune is a small firm with years of experience with nonprofit organizations. They understand the unique challenges that PCL as a 501(c)(3) organization faces serving a diverse community with growing needs.

With their guidance, PCL now has a Statement of Investment which was completed and approved by the Board at our August 2023 meeting and we have begun implementing it. At our September 2023 Board meeting the Sustainability Committee made the recommendation that we hire Altalune Wealth advisors as our certified financial advisors. The Board approved the recommendation unanimously.

After working with the Tredwins over this time, we continue to be impressed with their knowledge and commitment to us at PCL. With their expert advice, we are better able to position PCL for the future and our growth so we may better serve our community.

The Tredwins will be presenting two workshops for the community in September and October. Please see the flyer below. I hope you are able to join us for these programs and see for yourselves how fortunate we are to have them as our certified financial advisors. They bring us their wisdom from their experience and share it with you, our community. Please join us.

#### **Strategic Planning Update**

The Strategic Planning Committee has completed their work on eliciting feedback from you, our community, through 24 one-on-one interviews, 5 community focus groups and the patron survey, both in English and Spanish. We received 292 responses with a lot of quality data from each of the 12 questions asked on the survey.

Thank you so much to everyone who completed the patron survey, either online or on paper. We also

extend our heartfelt thanks to the focus group and interview participants who have provided their time, key insights, and vision of our future throughout this process. It has been a pleasure working with each of you to bring the next iteration of the library forward.

Preliminary analysis shows strong community support for PCL. Now that all this data has been collected, the hard work of summarizing, analyzing, and determining key priorities and areas of growth begins.

#### Our next steps will be:

- Summarizing, analyzing, and determining key priorities and areas of growth from the data collected in S.W.O.T. analysis (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats)
- Defining strategic goals, the measures of success, and key actions to bring the plan together
- Detailing a communication plan to share the plan with leadership, volunteers/staff, patrons and community partners
- Writing and reviewing the drafted plan with stakeholder groups, and then refining the draft from their input
- Finalize the plan and bring it to the Board for approval for adoption
- Implementation of the plan anticipated in October, marking a significant milestone in our journey

Your insights are helping us craft a plan that reflects the needs and aspirations of our community, ensuring the library remains a vital resource for all.

In the coming weeks, we will be sharing our preliminary findings from all we've learned about the community's needs, desires and wishes. Your continued support is important as we share the results and refine our plan online and through this newsletter.

We are committed to maintaining transparency throughout this process and will provide regular updates as we progress toward finalizing and implementing the Strategic Plan. Please stay tuned for further updates.

Again, the Committee would like to thank everyone in the community who has helped us so far with this project. As we progress through these steps, your feedback will continue to be our guiding light.



In each issue of our newsletter, "Susanne's Selections" highlights books in the library that would be of interest to our patrons.







The titles in Susanne's Selections have been added to our <u>online catalog</u>. Each book on display is <u>available for checkout with your library card</u>.

#### The Processing and Cataloguing Committee


Have you ever wondered how all of the new books, audio materials, and videos magically end up on the shelves of the library? Well, the dedicated members of the Processing and Cataloguing team are an integral part of this process. This group of volunteers not only assists in ordering books, they also process those materials when they arrive at the library. In addition, they enter materials onto the library catalogue, help keep our library catalogue current, assist in filling patrons' individual requests for materials, and complete a variety of other behind the scene tasks.

In order to keep our shelves stocked with books from new and popular authors, as well as books on "hot topics," this committee is responsible for physically ordering these materials from a variety of vendors. On average approximately 150 books are ordered monthly. About 25 videos are ordered quarterly. Additionally, patron requests are also ordered if possible.

New and donated books are processed by this group as they are delivered. This process includes downloading books, etc. into the library catalogue, printing and fixing correct labels on materials, and putting protective covers on books as needed. On average, the group processes about 60 books a week.

A few of the other many tasks this committee undertakes are repairing books, withdrawing books as needed, and assisting in keeping our library catalogue up to date.

As you browse the library shelves of fiction and nonfiction books, videos, children's books, audio books, and other library materials, remember that the Processing and Cataloguing committee is working behind the scenes to help make this possible. Please take the time to thank the committee chair Suanne Bryden and members/volunteers BJ Firestone, Carole Alt, and Linda Spaulding, for volunteering their time to serve on this committee.




Advanced tickets (guide booklets) are currently on sale at PCL. Day of Tour tickets (guide booklets) will

### Exploring Story as Medicine

## The Soulful Child: Twelve Years in the Wilderness with Chloe Rachel Gallaway

#### PCL welcomes author Chloe Rachel Gallaway on September 14 at 2 PM

Chloe describes herself as an author and 'Story Medicine Guide.' This book talk will offer an opportunity for engaged discussion about using 'story as medicine' in our lives. The core messages of Chloe's breathtaking memoir speak to loss, forgiveness, resilience, and transcendence of trauma through the healing power of Mother Nature.

Imagine living the first twelve years of your life in the wilderness. Imagine that your father, a musician on the verge of fame, gives up a life of



opportunity to walk with your mother right out of San Francisco and into the far-off woods of Northern New Mexico. Imagine that he is granted a lifetime lease to live on property owned by the actor Dennis Hopper for the price of one original song. Wild horses run on these native lands where pink, purple, orange, and yellow clay mountains rise up from the earth. Imagine a mother giving birth to six children with no medical supports. All six children grow strong with the spirit of nature inside of them, yet they crave—and one even dies in a tragic accident—to experience what they're missing in the world. The story illuminates the eternal crux of all humanity: there is no place to hide from one's internal struggles; we must come face—to—face with ourselves, to evolve, and heal. Gallaway leads by brave example, using her own life story as the lesson.

Her award-winning book is making an impact and inspiring readers by helping them to see life through the eyes of the Soulful Child. Her story became the foundation for her unique story medicine process, in which, she is assisting aspiring writers to reclaim their voice, truth, and power through the writing of their story. 

In recognition of National Mental Illness Awareness Week, some of the poems will honor the role of poetry as a witness to mental health challenges.


Hilda Raz lives in Placitas, New Mexico, and is currently the Series Editor for Poetry at the University of New Mexico Press and Poetry Editor for Bosque Press. Prior to her move to New Mexico, she was

the editor of the literary journal *Prairie Schooner* from 1987 to 2010 and is the founding director of the *Prairie Schooner* Raz—Shumaker Book Prizes in poetry and short fiction. In 1993 she was named the first Luschei Professor and Editor in the Department of English at the University of Nebraska where she has worked intensively with graduate students in the Ph.D. program. She has published fourteen books as a poet, nonfiction writer, and editor. Her recent books include *Letter from a Place I've Never Been* and *List & Story*.


Katherine DiBella Seluja is a poet and a micro fiction writer. Her most recent poetry collection, *Point of Entry* (UNM Press, 2023) focuses on issues of immigration and ancestry. Her previous book, *Gather the Night* (UNM Press, 2018) is dedicated to her older brother who lived with schizophrenia and substance use disorder. She is co-author with Tina Carlson and Stella Reed, of the award-winning collaborative collection, *We Are Meant to Carry Water* (3: A Taos Press, 2019). Katherine's poem, "November Fruit," is on permanent display at the Helen Wurlitzer Foundation as part of the Taos Poetry in Nature project. Recent work can be found in South 85 Journal, Medmic, Cutthroat, and Taos Journal of Poetry. Katherine has worked in pediatrics for over 40 years. She is a poetry editor at Unbroken Journal and lives in Santa Fe.

Sarah Kotchian is an Albuquerque writer whose creative work arises from the solitude and beauty of walks in the New Mexico mountains. Her most recent book of poetry, *Light of Wings*, reflects the abundant beauty of the world and the grief of losses that are at once personal and universal. *Camino*, her book of poetry and photographs about her 500-mile solo pilgrimage on the Camino de Santiago in Spain, received the New Mexico-Arizona Book Award and the Seven Sisters Book Award. A contributor at the 2019 Bread Loaf Writers' Conference and a Pushcart nominee, her writing has appeared in numerous journals and on the podcast "The Unruly Muse."

Mental Health Awareness Week is recognized annually during the first week in October. Begun by an Act of Congress in the US in 1990, this week is dedicated to increasing awareness and education regarding mental health and its challenges. It is part of the larger month-long awareness campaign for depression and mental health screening. October 10<sup>th</sup> is recognized as World Mental Health Day in over 150 countries and works to stop the stigma against mental illness.

#### PCL will feature a Book Talk by Dr. Tom Sanford on October 12 at 2 PM

A Whirlwind History of the Universe and Mankind: From the Big Bang to the Higgs Boson is essential to anyone who is curious about how we humans came to exist, and to understand the science and social evolution which now enables us to demonstrate that a Big Bang occurred 14.7 billion years ago!

Dr. Sanford's book explains the transitions between the many evolutionary plateaus: from our universe's beginning at the Big Bang, to the emergence of Homo Sapiens—highlighting the Mediterranean civilizations of Greece and Rome, the European Renaissance, the English industrial revolution, and early European science discoveries. Of particular note are discoveries in physics, including the Manhattan Project (right here in New Mexico) and the subsequent development of the new field of high-energy particle physics. This entire history, which eventually culminated in the discovery of the mass-giving Higgs boson, is clearly articulated in this monumental but concise work—and in language for educated lay audiences.

Thomas Sanford received his Ph.D. in physics from Columbia University under Nobel Laureate Leon Lederman. After his graduation, he conducted high-energy physics experiments at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory in England, the CERN (European Council for Nuclear Research) Laboratory in Switzerland, and the Brookhaven National Laboratory in New York, participating in the discovery of the charm quark. He then joined Sandia National Laboratories in Albuquerque, as a senior member of the technical staff, becoming a Distinguished Member in 1991. While at Sandia, he engineered a breakthrough in the physics of Z-pinches, opening wire arrays as possible drivers for inertial confinement fusion. In 2000, he became a fellow of the American Physical Society and in 2005 was awarded the Hannes Alfven Prize by the European Physical Society. Tom is now retired from Sandia and currently lives in Albuquerque.

Tom Sanford's presentation will highlight key elements of his book, allowing ample time for questions and refreshments, plus signing copies of the book.



#### The NM Forestry Seedling Program

Where can you purchase 49 small seedlings for \$90—a mere \$1.84 per seedling? New Mexico's Conservation Seedling Program, of course!

Twice a year, the New Mexico Forestry Division Conservation Seedling Program makes low-cost, native seedlings available to landowners for purposes of "...reforestation, erosion control, windbreaks, streambank restoration, and wildlife habitat improvement." The program, which started in the 1960s, has made millions of trees, shrubs and other plants available to landowners. In return, these plants "...store carbon, provide cooling shade, and help with water infiltration. Further, seedlings can be used for reforestation projects after catastrophic wildfire and/or tree mortality due to insect and disease epidemics."

The Fall distribution starts in September, and orders are being taken now, on a first come, first serve basis. View the available seedling list here. Conservation seedlings available this Fall include same species lots and "packages" that combine several seedling types together. So, get your order in now for Fall planting!

"Gardening is the art of sowing hope and anticipation," opines an anonymous source, and according to Sue Ortiz, it seems natural to apply the same notion of "hope and anticipation" when considering the accomplished work of the seven artists featured in this year's Placitas Garden Tour Exhibit. The exhibition begins August 31 and continues through September 26 in PCL's Gracie Lee Community Room.



Exhibition coordinators Ortiz and Sandy Johnson have also paired this year's artists— Seung Youn, Dana Patterson Roth, Jay Leutwyler, Barbara Morrow, Karen Melody Shatar, Steve McKibbin, and Dale Laitinen—with gardens on the annual tour. The artists will be making new work in their assigned gardens on Sunday, September 8, the day of the Tour, and interacting with visitors. Details about each destination are available online, including enticing images of the gardens and examples of each artist's work. Expect to find delightful sculptures, watercolor and pastel landscapes, photography, and fused glass creations.



Volunteers will be available at the library on September 8 from 10 AM to 4 PM to assist those who want to purchase works from the exhibition. Art may also be purchased from the library help desk during regular hours. Thirty percent of all sales will be gifted to PCL and the Placitas Garden Tour as a donation.

Advance tickets to the Garden Tour cost \$15 and can be purchased online, at PCL and the Merc, or in Albuquerque at Alameda Greenhouse, Jericho Nursery, Osuna Nursery, Plants of the Southwst, and Rehms Nursery. Tickets purchased the day of the tour at an outdoor ticket table at the library will cost \$20. The Tour's ticket holders who visit the library may also enter to win a garden-related gift basket with items donated by local businesses and volunteers. The winner does not have to be present for the drawing which will occur at the close of the Tour (4 PM).


Suggested ages: 7-10 years

Ferris's summer, before entering 5<sup>th</sup> grade, evolves into a memorable one! Pinkey, her younger sister, is determined to become an "outlaw." Her Uncle Ted, now living in the basement, is engrossed in a self-imposed project of painting the history of the world. And Charisse, Ferris's ailing grandmother, has seen a ghost whose command is to light the dining room chandelier with real candles. Ferris and her friend, Billy Jackson, wind their way through one challenge after another as they encounter the desires of Ferris's quirky family.



#### Suggested ages: 3-7 years

"Make the good and noble choice!!" is imprinted on an old sardine can with which Orris, a rat, has adorned his cozy nest in an abandoned barn. Little did he think such words would foretell of events to come. One evening, a desperate call for help comes from a small white owl, Timble. His foot is caught in a rat trap. He is scared and helpless. Recalling Aesop's tale, the Lion and the Mouse, and glancing over at his colorful tin can, Orris revs up his courage and goes to the rescue.

Orris is a gritty, practical fellow, but his tenderness wins out and a new friendship blooms. Perhaps this is truly "the beginning" and young readers will have more Orris and Timble tales to look

forward to. The full-page illustrations are done in muted tones with the exception of the "Imperial Sardine Can," shining with its wise words. Monk skillfully expresses Orris and Timble's changing emotions as the story unfurls. Young readers will easily perceive this evolution of feelings by the pictures alone.


#### Bink & Gollie: Two for One




#### Fly Girl by Ann Hood

"The job gave me things I never could have imagined: the ability to talk in front of a couple of hundred people and navigate the subways and streets of foreign cities with ease. It taught me to listen, to be kind and helpful and compassionate. For every love story I heard, there was a tale of cruelty, or a broken heart. I learned there are misogynists in the world, sure, but that most people are pretty wonderful."

Memories of walking in high heels over a million miles, knowing how to deliver a new born baby, handling both amorous and irate customers with aplomb, and seeing the world as a flight attendant – or as they were known then, a stewardess – Ann Hood realized her lifelong goal to become a stewardess. In her charming and enlightening memoir, she addresses the negative experiences she encountered, such as sexism, the restrictions and demands of the job, and the positive, thrilling experiences, such as romantic interests, travel opportunities to exotic lands, meeting inspiring passengers, learning "to laugh at human"


foibles," and "to stop taking small things too seriously." In the "golden age" of travel during the 1970-1980's, the passengers dressed up to fly and stewardesses were considered the epitome of glamour. Hood also discusses the airline industry during that time and how and why it changed, including the devastating airline bankruptcies. I thoroughly enjoyed this delightful, informative book.

The Diving Bell and the Butterfly by Jean-Dominique Bauby



In 1995, 44-year-old Jean-Dominique Bauby was the editor-inchief of the legendary French "Elle" magazine. A bon vivant and father of two young children, he was admired for his savoir faire and passion for life. Sadly, he suffered a stroke causing him to be capable of communicating only by blinking his left eyelid. He was diagnosed as suffering from the rare condition called "Locked-in Syndrome," unable to breathe, swallow, or eat without assistance.

The medical staff created a special alphabet with the understanding that Bauby would blink at letters he wanted written down. Repeating the process resulted in words, sentences, and entire discussions. With the help of a special nurse, Claude Mendibil, and friends, he was able to write his book, using only his ability to blink at the most frequently used letters of the alphabet: E, S, A, R, I, N, T, etc., while Mendibil or a friend pointed to them on a screen: one blink for "yes," two blinks for "no."




Demonstrating incredible spirit and resoluteness, Bauby's profound memoir, with its beautiful poetic prose, is a moving testament to the human spirit. Somewhat reminiscent of the brilliant memoir, "When Life Becomes Breath" by Paul Kalanithi, it's one of the most extraordinary, memorable, and affecting books I've ever read. Yes, it's a poignant book, but full of insight and humor. Bauby doesn't focus on his condition, instead he pokes fun at it, and his creative self soars to imaginings of sharing time with his family, being transported to his favorite haunts, and savoring his favorite foods (he was fed via a feeding tube and drooled incessantly).

Metaphorically, the book title imagines an immobile deep-sea diver weighed down in an old-fashioned diving helmet and suit and Bauby's mind, moving like a butterfly from letter to letter, to ultimately write a 100-page masterpiece. Bauby died two days after the publication of his book in France on March 9, 1997.

Admirably, while bedridden, Bauby created the first association in the world for people suffering from Locked-In Syndrome: ALIS (Association du Locked-In Syndrome) and became its first president, stating his objectives thus: "To collect all the present information about the syndrome, to allow sufferers to communicate better with one another, to create means of breaking the solitude and isolation, and to make them true citizens of the 21st century."

I originally watched the movie based on the book, "The Diving Bell and the Butterfly: A Memoir of Life in Death," in French with subtitles many years ago and was utterly entranced by it. I later read the book. Not bleak by any means, it's a testament to one man's incredible accomplishment and courage.



## A Great Country by Shilpi Somaya Gowda

The Shah family has relocated from a lovely, middle-class city in Southern California to Pacific Hills, a wealthy (fictional) enclave (think Newport Coast in Orange County, California) where their lives are "turned upside down." The three teenagers in the family are not thrilled about the move, since they will miss their friends from the old neighborhood, while the parents are extremely pleased that they achieved the "American Dream," and can afford to live in such a prestigious neighborhood.



Arriving in the U.S. from India 20 years ago, through hard work and determination, they believe they have reached the apex of their lives. Unbeknownst to them, they didn't consider the social challenges they encounter.

After twelve-year-old Ajay is erroneously arrested, the family is shocked and confused at the treatment both they and Ajay receive by the judicial system. They don't know whether or not

their treatment is based on being immigrants. And then to make matters worse, the neighbors demonstrate conflicting behavior as they witness police cars visiting the Shah's new palatial home.

A worthy read, it delves into numerous aspects of life and examines how each one affects the family: cultural differences, success, ambition, class division, family dynamics, prejudice, and social status. What I particularly appreciated were the many questions and excellent points the author raised regarding the challenges immigrants face in their lives. Gowda is an extraordinary writer and I look forward to reading her future books.

Gowda "holds an MBA from Stanford University, and a Bachelor's Degree in Economics from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where she was a Morehead-Cain scholar. She has served on the Advisory Board of the Children's Defense Fund, and is a Patron of Childhaven International, the organization for which she volunteered in India."



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
